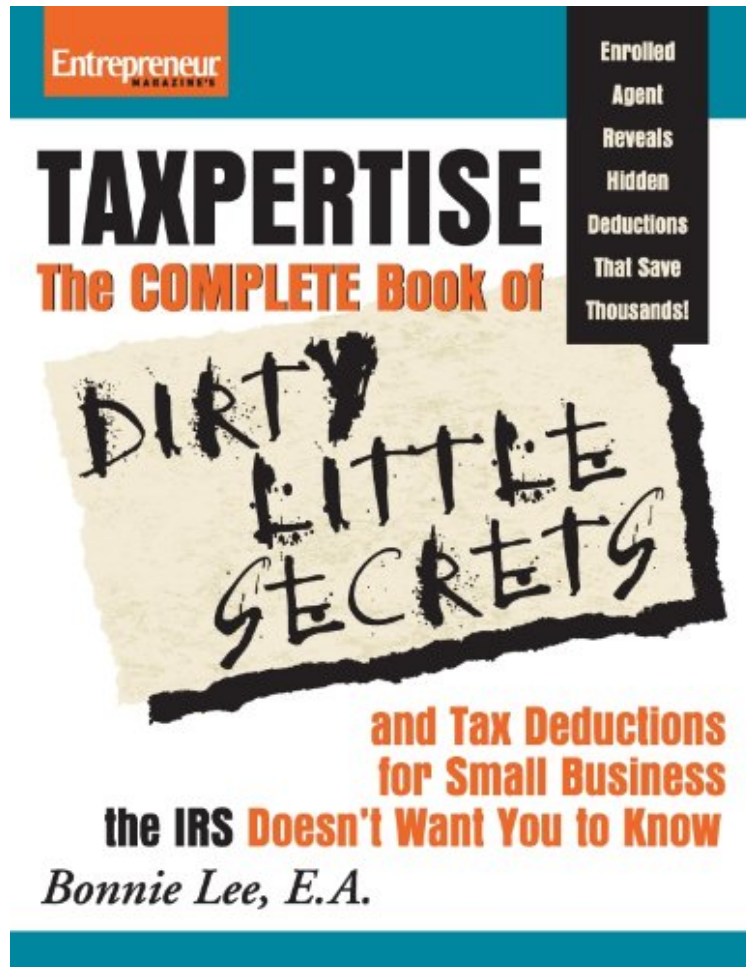

I am not a tax expert but a financial reporting kind of person, but I do know my way around the basics of taxation law.On an overall basis, the author does a great job of breaking things down for the everyday person to understand, including some do's and

don't's, I believe everyone who is operating their own business should understand: if you miss a lot of the basic deductions, you are unnecessarily giving away money to the IRS. The writing style is in plain-English, and doesn't attempt to overwhelm you with complex language or citations to IRC Section this or that. The majority of this information is what every small business owner's CPA should be telling his or her client throughout the year. If you are beyond the startup phase of your business, most of this information will not be new to you: it is fairly straight forward and I really didn't see too many "Dirty Little Secrets" that made me have an "aha" moment: most of this information is found in introductory business how-to guides that feature the startup that most of you have seen elsewhere. If you have no prior business experience, this guide will be very handy; if you already have the basics or have been in business for a couple of years, you probably want to give this one a pass.
